Cinema and the Spanish Civil War: A Conflict that Stirred the World



The **Spanish Civil War (1936-1939)** was not just a Spanish affair. Around the world film-makers of the time, and many others since then, found it impossible not to engage with this terrible period. In their many different ways, artists like Ernest Hemingway, Luis Buñuel, Alain Resnais, Pablo Picasso, Paul Éluard or George Orwell all reacted to what was happening in Spain, drawing attention to it through their work.

With the triumph of Franco's troops, Spain entered a dark period of repression and censorship. There was no space for cinema to engage with the recent war and the tyranny of the new system – though some film-makers did manage to get around the censors and present visions of a Spain rather different from the regime's.

Following the death of the Generalísimo in 1975, Spain began to explore the Civil War and its legacy in earnest. Seventy years after the end of the war, this season offers different views of the period and its consequences. There are documentaries and films such as the Oscar nominated *Blockade* (1938) with **Henry Fonda** and **Ken Loach's** *Land and Freedom* (1995) that look directly at the war itself, as well as films that use the period as a backdrop to other stories as in *For Whom the Bell Tolls* (1943) with **Ingrid Bergman** and **Gary Cooper**. These have been produced in film cultures as diverse as Hollywood, the USSR, Spain with films such as *¡Ay, Carmela!* (1990), France with **Alan Renais'** *La Guerre est finie* (1966), the UK and East Germany. The programme also includes a selection of NO-DOs – Noticiarios Documentales, or News and Documentaries – cinema propaganda newsreels that Franco used from 1939 until 1981 to update the population about the latest official truths.

The very first film in this survey – *España* - having been made in 1936 and the most recent – *La Buena nueva* - dating from 2008, this programme represents more than seven decades of cinema trying to do justice to these historic events.

The Spanish Earth

Written and narrated by Ernest Hemingway, *The Spanish Earth* shows people's daily lives in their struggle to survive as well as the Republican army at the front. Both John Dos Passos and Orson Welles left this project because of differences with Hemingway.

The Republic's Ministry of Foreign Affairs entrusted this propaganda film to Luis Buñuel, then in Paris, who wrote it. Finally made by Le Chanois, the film depicts the resistance of the Republic and the involvement of the International Brigades through a montage of still photos and footage.

Return to Life

A documentary on American medical aid and humanitarian work in Republican Spain, and the cinematic debut of French photographer Cartier-Bresson, who went to Spain as a volunteer. His earlier meeting in New York with the politically involved Kline and the Film and Photo League awoke his interest in film-making.

Kline uses images of the civilian population under attack and the international aid to both civilians and Republican soldiers, to show the anguish and suffering of a people in wartime.

Blockade

In this war-torn drama of action and romance, Fonda's character, Marco, has to take up arms to fight during the Spanish Civil War and along the way falls in love with a foreigner involved in espionage. This brave film tackles a subject that was then very delicate in Hollywood, and it later brought problems with the House Committee on Un-American Activities for Dieterle and screenwriter John Howard Lawson.

In spite of trouble surrounding the film's release, it was still Oscar-nominated for Best Original Story and Score.

Ispaniya

In August 1936 the Central Committee of the Communist Party sent film-maker Roman Karmen and cameraman Boris Makaseev to Spain to record as much as possible of the war from the Republican side. The actual making of this documentary was then given to experienced editor Shub, who eventually received directorial credit.

L'Espoir

Boasting a cast drawn mainly from the Republican troops, and based on Malraux's novel of the same title, this is a romantic look at how Republicans, with much dignity and very poor means, fought the fascist army. Himself a volunteer, Malraux shot it in 1938, but the film was only released – albeit in a cut rather different from Malraux's – after WW2 was over.

Five brigadiers have to deliver an important message, torn into five pieces and hidden in empty bullet shells. In constant fear of the enemy and dehydrated, the men start an odyssey across the Spanish sierras.

La Guerre est finie

Resnais here follows the troubles of Diego, a middle-aged member of the Spanish Communist Party in exile. Written by Jorge Semprún, himself a member of the Party in France, it constitutes a powerful statement about memory, commitment and faith – and managed to intensely irritate the Spanish government, which asked – unsuccessfully – for the film to be withdrawn from Cannes in 1966.

Songs for After a War Canciones para después de una guerra

With a superb and at times moving montage including still photos, archive footage, films, adverts and popular songs from the time, this is an incisive look at the war and, mostly, at post-war daily and public life. Though the film was forbidden a release by state censorship until the death of the dictator, private screenings were organised for Franco, government personnel and family members to watch the film.

The Spirit of the Beehive El espíritu de la colmena

'...When I look around me and I see so much that's missing, so much that's destroyed and also so much sadness, something tells me that we've lost, with those things, our capacity to feel life.' Erice's modern classic about a family in quiet crisis offers a subtle critique of the damage caused by the war as seen through the eyes of a little girl, with hauntingly poetic images.

Caudillo

Following the template of his *Songs for After a War*, and working clandestinely after the controversy that film aroused, Patino made a clever montage of mostly archive footage looking Franco's initial quest for power in Africa up until his seizure of power. In his effort to be objective, Patino shows both sides'

vision, producing nonetheless a subtly ironic and intelligent film.

Demonios en el jardín

Secret loves, jealousies and betrayals converge against a backdrop of postwar Spain with a child – of the age of the writer-director himself at the time the film is set – providing testimony. Blessed with an outstanding performance by two of the finest Spanish actresses, Aragón portrays the hypocrisy, severity

and miseries of a family that has achieved economic success in the black market and supports the dictatorship.

Las bicicletas son para el verano

One of the best portraits of day-to-day civilian life during the war. Rather than focusing on the conflict, the film – based on a play by the great actor, director and writer Fernando Fernán Gómez – follows the ups and downs of a middle-class family and its neighbours during the war years; how they survive

and adapt to circumstances and – with political alignment barely registering – their wish for it all to end and peace to arrive.

The Good Fight

A moving documentary about the 3,200 American men and women who fought alongside other international brigades in the Spanish Civil War. Narrated by radio legend Studs Terkel, the film looks at the reasons and the dreams behind their decision to leave behind the safety of the United States, their

experiences at the front and the return home when the war was coming to an inevitably tragic end.

La vaquilla

After a long period of trench conflict, a routine atmosphere grows among Republican soldiers. Monotony is broken when Nationalists announce that they're going to celebrate the Virgin's Day with a bullfight. Written by the director's regular collaborator, black comedy specialist Rafael Azcona, the film looks, with good humour and conciliatory optimism, at the sometimes absurd relationship between both sides, with soldiers recruited by chance, depending on the territory they were in and where the front was.

¡Ay, Carmela!

Named after one of the favourite songs of the Republican army, *¡Ay, Carmela!* relates the adventures and misadventures of two Republican artists touring Spain during the Spanish Civil War and going into rebel territory by mistake... In contrast to some of Saura's previous films, where the war was presented with brutality, here he looks at it with some humour – much aided by the comic skills of the two lead actors.

Land and Freedom

In early 1936 a young unemployed communist leaves his hometown of Liverpool to join the fight against fascism with the International Brigades in Spain. With characteristic commitment, Loach tells the story of one individual which nonetheless reflects the experiences of so many British men who went to fight in Spain. The result is a powerful, moving and realistic film.

Libertarias

A group of Anarchist women fight for their dreams of equality not only against the Nationalists, but also against factions of the Republican side who want to impose a more traditional military structure. In line with his consistent concern with social issues, Aranda's look at the Civil War shows not only the brutality, but also the important involvement of women on the Republican side.
