## Opening venues: BFI Southbank plus selected cinemas nationwide

Set over a single 24-hour period in postwar Bethnal Green, Robert Hamer's noir-ish thriller *It Always Rains on Sunday* was Ealing Studios' first popular success and is widely considered one of the greatest achievements of British cinema of the late 1940s. Digitally remastered by the BFI Archive, *It Always Rains on Sunday* is released on 26 October to selected cinemas nationwide and will be the centrepiece film of the 'Dark Ealing' season at BFI Southbank.

Hamer's acclaimed slice-of-working-class-life is set in the streets of the busy back-to-back terraced slums of East London, populated by a cast of connected characters who survive by their instincts, finding small pleasures in uncertain and difficult times. Ex-barmaid Rose Sandigate (Googie Withers) lives with her dull but decent husband George (Edward Chapman), their young son Alfie (David Lines) and

two grown-up stepdaughters, Vi (Susan Shaw) and Doris (Patricia Plunkett). One Sunday morning Rose's life is turned upside down by the arrival of Tommy Swann (John McCallum), her former fiancé, who has just broken out of Dartmoor and is demanding food and a few hours' refuge in their old air raid shelter ...

Adapted from a novel by Arthur La Bern (whose 'Goodbye Piccadilly, Farewell Leicester' formed the basis of Hitchcock's **Frenzy**), **It Only Rains on Sunday** was atmospherically shot by Douglas Slocombe and graced by a distinctive score from Georges Auric. The doomed passion of Rose and Tommy is brilliantly portrayed by Googie Withers and John McCallum (lovers in real life who married the following year). A potent mix of lyricism, realism and suspense, **It Only Rains on Sunday** is unafraid to show to seamier side of postwar Britain (many of its characters are crooks and chancers, and at least one kills) – prompting Bethnal Green residents of the time to protest at their portrayal and the Cinematograph Exhibitors Association's reviewer to declare it 'an unsavoury film ... with appeal only to those with very broad minds'. Despite (or because of) that, it was Ealing's box-office hit of the year and remains a triumph of postwar British cinema.
