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## Shinjuku Diaries: Films from The Art Theatre Guild of Japan At BFI Southbank in August 2011



For many years **The Art Theatre Guild of Japan** was the home for Japanese filmmakers seeking creative independence. Throughout August **BFI Southbank** presents a season that marks the first UK retrospective of the Guild's experimental, vibrant and innovative output. Screenings of titles including **Pitfall** (1962), **Double Suicide** (1969) and **Pastoral Hide and Seek** (1974) with many being introduced by experts in the field including **Julian Ross, Hirasawa Go, Roland Domenig, Jasper Sharp** and **Tony Rayns**.

Partially inspired by the **BFI**, The Art Theatre Guild of Japan (**ATG**) was inaugurated in 1961 to tackle the deficiency in the showcasing of world cinema. ATG began as a distribution and exhibition association, programming an array of foreign and local titles scarcely or never screened before in the country. In 1967, ATG began to provide financial support for local independent filmmakers by co-producing their projects with the guarantee of unrestrained freedom. Beginning with Imamura's **A Man Vanishes** (1967) and Oshima's **Death by Hanging** (1968), ATG became the driving force behind a burst of creativity that represents the most innovative and audacious works by a generation of Japanese filmmakers.

Brought together for the first time in the UK, and curated by film historians **Roland Domenig** and **Hirasawa Go**, this 13 film selection of ATG titles represents an apex in Japan's creative explosion that united different corners of artistic activity into the realm of cinema.

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**Pitfall** (*Otoshiana*)

In this first of a run of feature collaborations with novelist and playwright Abe Kobo and composer Takemitsu Toru, realism is balanced with allegory in a tale where tangible problems result in ghostly consequences. Teshigahara portrays inhabitants of a coal-mining town who, ruthlessly attacked by a silent assassin, turn into ghosts and aimlessly roam the wastelands in a fable once named by the director himself a 'documentary fantasy'.

**Silence Has No Wings** (*Tobenai Chinmoku*)

Kuroki Kazuo presents a series of life's vignettes from different corners of the Japanese islands. The buoyant cinematography by Suzuki Tatsuo captivates as the camera follows the development of a caterpillar into a butterfly while documenting the nation's history of melancholia on personal and societal levels. Kaga Mariko performs multiple roles to interconnect the stranded narratives and the ethereal soundscape pulls together an assortment of voices, both real and imagined.

**A Man Vanishes** (*Ningen Johatsu*)

Imamura and his crew set out on a search for a young woman's fiancé in an investigative documentary that pushes the limits of its genre until its established walls collapse. The boundaries between fact and fiction blur then vanish as the search spirals out of grasp to the point we question, along with Imamura, the extent a filmmaker controls what cinema is able to capture.

**Death by Hanging** (*Koshikei*)

Capital punishment and the plight of Koreans in Japan are tackled through absurdist farce in the film that launched Oshima onto the world stage. Basing his story on a real-life figure, Oshima imagines a convicted Korean youth who survives execution and consequently develops amnesia, illuminating a loophole in the

Japanese judicial system. The officials re-enact his murders in an attempt to resuscitate his memory with hilarious yet darkly poignant outcomes.

**The Inferno of First Love** (*Hatsuko Jigoku-hen*)

In an inspired collaboration between Terayama Shuji and Hani Susumu, the two contrasting voices of the art scene come together to produce a tender tale of adolescent confusion. Shun's troubled childhood suffocates his repressed sexuality and his intimate encounters with nude model Nanami and young Momi only bemuse him further. Despite the tendentious subject matters of abuse and impotence put forward by Terayama, Hani's camera caresses rather than condescends.

**Human Bullet** (*Nikudan*)

Reputed for his samurai films with Toho, Okamoto Kihachi also wrote and directed a number of films filtered through his experiences as a wartime soldier. This anti-war satire follows a nameless soldier who, on the day of freedom before his suicide mission, meets his first and final love. Mixing bittersweet humour with melancholic vexation, Okamoto never imposes his views, but his message is deeply felt.

**Double Suicide** (*Shinju Ten No Amijima*)

Adapting Chikamatsu Monzaemon's renowned bunraku play for the screen, Shinoda's radical modernisation of traditional forms revisits the familiar discord between social obligation and personal emotion. The domestic drama paints Jihei and Koharu as two lovers unable to consummate their unity and stuck for options. Theatrical aesthetics discover new realms in cinematic expression where sets collapse to reveal their artifice and hooded puppeteers interfere and guide the destiny of their characters.

**This Transient Life** (*Mujo*)

TV-director Jissoji Akio's feature debut – and one of ATG's biggest hits – is a sensuous exploration of Buddhist spirituality in tandem with sex. Scripted by Ishido Toshiro, the film contemplates incest with a daring sincerity that chimes with its unique shot composition and fluid camera movements that seem to defy gravity. The lucid pace and captivating control of its aesthetic universe enthralled its audience worldwide on its release.

**Lost Lovers** (*Arakajime Ushinawareta Koibitotachi yo*)

In their feature debut, TV documentarist Tahara Soichiro and avant-garde playwright Shimizu Kunio create a brisk portrayal of Japanese youth after the failed student protests of the 1960s. On an aimless journey to northern Japan, a garrulous former pole-vault youth champion meets a young deaf couple and discovers a new way of communication without words. Newcomer Momoi Kaoru makes an impressive debut by creating a new type of female heroine.

**Pandemonium Shura / aka Demons**

Matsumoto blackens the screen in an adaptation of Nanboku Tsuruya's *Kamikakete sango taisetsu*. Relentlessly pessimistic, the tale depicts a story of bitter betrayal and brutal revenge that is infused, here in its film version, by Matsumoto's characteristic blurring of imagination and the real. With riveting intensity, aestheticised violence reaches its indomitable peak in what Noel Burch has called 'the most important and beautiful film made in Japan since Kurosawa's prime'.

Extreme-left politics and sex collide in ATG's most controversial feature, where pink cinema's enfant terrible Wakamatsu Koji and Adachi Masao depict Tokyo as a bomb-zone at the boiling point of social agitation. Intimately linked with real-life activism, actual revolutionaries participated in production and the film pierced the zeitgeist by anticipating the bombing of police stations. Riveting intensity blackens the screen in a tale of betrayal and paranoia between extremist organisations.

**Pastoral Hide and Seek** (*Den'en Ni Shisu*)

A virtuoso who worked across many artistic disciplines, countercultural icon Terayama reshuffles his own material to explore the tensions between past and present, reality and fantasy, one art form and its peripheral neighbours in this film which borrows from his poetry collection of the same title. A filmmaker revisits his past as the subject for his new feature, only to find himself interacting with his childhood self.
